CHAIRPERSON'S REPORT

My fellow Tribal Members,

Like the Habematolel government, California's tribal leaders represent other recognized governments—our own separate and sovereign governments that protect our people, our history, and our ability to achieve economic self-sufficiency.

While 2019 ushers in a new administration in California and newly elected legislators, we tribal leaders, encourage them to better understand us, and look forward to helping them prioritize policies that can protect and enhance our lives.

With those goals in mind, I offer a backdrop of our Tribe's history as reminder of the perspective we approach with many lawmakers when moving our agenda and our needs for legislation forward.

Our ancestors have lived and governed themselves in the area called California since 6,000 B.C. Early contact with the Russians and Spanish was brutal. The great influx of people created by the American annexation of California and the gold rush brought conflict and disease which in one generation destroyed 95 percent of our population.

Flawed federal policies, some of which lasted until the 1970's, subjected our people to enslavement, abuse, slaughter followed by boarding schools and cultural destruction. Our Tribe's most grim memory is an aggressive 1850 military operation known as the "Bloody Island Massacre" in which the U.S. Cavalry nearly slaughtered almost our entire population. Elders, women and children were murdered.

Despite efforts to destroy us, we have persevered. In the past 20 years, the Habematolel Pomo of Upper Lake have begun to reestablish our government and, with it, our dignity, culture and identity. As the Chairwoman for the past decade, like my fellow Executive Council members, I take pride in helping to lead this effort, and look forward to helping California's other leaders understand our history and vision for the Pomo people, as well as our role in state, regional, and local economies.



California has made tremendous strides toward establishing laws and regulations as well as taking policy positions that contemplate not only what is best for the state government, but also what tribes and tribal governments desire for their own people.

For example, activities undertaken by California's Department of Fish and Wildlife to manage wildlife and natural habitats could impact tribal lands and interests. Because of that, the department has set a precedent of government-to-government consultation, employing a tribal liaison who engages with tribes and advises the department on policy matters that impact tribes.

California's Attorney General Becerra (Democrat) has led a second multi state amici effort in support of the constitutionality of the ICWA (Indian Child Welfare Act) in opposition of Texas' complaint filed against the federal government. The case is currently in the 5th circuit court of appeals <https://turtletalk.files.wordpress.com/2019/01/tribalgovtamicusbrief.pdf>. Past efforts represent an important step in the right direction. But to ensure that California law truly respects tribes' place in the state, all proposed policies need to explicitly recognize tribal sovereignty and require coordination with tribal governments.

Like the State of California, tribal governments exercise their sovereign authority to create laws that lay the foundation for good governance and proper regulation. Because of the harsh control exerted by the federal government for hundreds of years, our Tribe was left with no traditional tax base, such as property, sales, or income taxes. That's why, as a sovereign government, we have passed laws that allow the development of economic enterprises that provide jobs for the Tribal Members and the community, and provide basic needs for our Members, including health care services and education. Tribal governments are a leading force in economic development in rural areas of California.

Governor-elect Gavin Newsom has indicated that Gov. Jerry Brown's policy of consulting and coordinating with tribal governments will continue to progress. The Legislature has two tribal members, San Diego Democrat Assemblyman Todd Gloria of the Tlingit Haida Indian Tribe from Alaska and Democrat Assemblyman James Ramos, former chairman of the San Manuel Band of Mission Indians, and the first California Native American legislator. Two Native American women were also newly-elected to Congress Representatives this past year, Sharice Davids (D-KS and Ho-Chunk Tribal Member) and Deb Haaland (D-NM and Laguna Pueblo Tribal Member).

While Tribes like ours become more engaged in the global economy, we are aided in that we are no longer limited by isolated locations or the amount of land owned due to the great equalizer, the internet. The internet provides

a highway to our tribal lands where consumers residing off the reservation can access our products. We must as a result be vigilant in our efforts to educate lawmakers in California and beyond. Every state and every legislator, regulator and enforcer must understand tribes' current methods of economic development within the context of their historical treatment. The US Congress recognizes the role of economic development in tribal self-determination and self-sufficiency.

As elected leaders in California and across the United States engage in critically important conversations about issues involving the environment and consumers, they must also remember the importance of recognizing tribal sovereignty. Policies must reflect reality. Our governments co-exist in the same way federal and state governments co-exist, and the efficacy of one often depends on the efficacy of the other.

Decisions at the state, regional, and local level cannot be made in a vacuum. We know our Tribe's health, welfare, and future is intertwined with the success of our state and local community. That's why tribal governments endeavor to be good stewards of our lands and vital contributors to our local economies.

As California, indeed every state in our union, embarks on a new legislative session, we urge state governments and their leaders to continue working with tribes for the benefit of all Americans.

TRIBAL ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT

4th Quarter 2018

No doubt about it, 2018 was a tough year for the Tribe. Most of the fourth quarter was spent in recovery mode from the devastating Mendocino-Complex fire that took place in July and August. We focused most of our time on rebuilding what was lost and empathized with our neighbors in Butte County, who were having to endure the same destruction by the campfire, for most of November.

it opened its doors and active volunteer within the Tribe serving in several capacities. She will be truly missed.



HPUL hosted the Federal Emergency Management Services (FEMA) station at our community building to do our part in assisting both Tribal and community members seeking many forms of disaster recovery assistance.

As if the recovery efforts of the fire weren't enough the Tribe had to encounter another tragedy in early October when it suffered the loss of Tribal Elder Gail Treppa. Gail had been an employee of Running Creek Casino since



They say what doesn't kill you, only makes you stronger; this could not have been a more fitting statement during these trying times. The Tribe has been through difficult times and suffered tragedy throughout its long history. We have suffered losses of loved ones before and in recent

years there have been numerous fires that have affected our people, but we are still here persevering and looking toward the future.

Despite the challenges of the latter part of the year, the Tribe was still able to focus on the future and get a number of things done that will come to have a significant effect on the Members of the Tribe. On October 26, 2018 the Executive Council passed the Cemetery Ordinance, to provide local Members guidance when utilizing the Tribe's sacred ground. The Tribe's Enrollment Ordinance which was originally adopted in September of 2000 was also amended on November 2, 2018.

In addition to the completion of these governing documents, on November 7th and 8th the Tribe hosted an Indian Land Workshop that was led by the Real Estate Department of the US Department of Interior (DOI) and Bureau of Indians Affairs (BIA). The two day workshop allowed Tribal Members as well as natives from other local Tribes, to learn about the complicated matters involving property disputes and processes when dealing with land that is held in Trust by the United States government. Kimberly Yearyean (pictured below) and her staff were also available each day after the workshop to help individuals seek information and provide answers to sometimes very complicated scenarios.



As the year ended with the holiday season, the Tribe remembered to be thankful for what we have and what we have accomplished, in light of the recent challenging times. We are very fortunate to be in a position to offer

services and comfort to those who have suffered.



I am hopeful that 2019 will bring an abundance of positive change and opportunity as we face new challenges and obstacles in the upcoming year.

The Tribe has a very unique incentive program entitled “**Job Incentive/General Welfare Stimulus Program**”. This program seeks to reward and provide motivation for HPUL Tribal Members in the work force by disbursing quarterly payments to offset the rising cost of living for food, shelter, clothing and transportation. These costs can become very complicated for Tribal Members who may be transitioning into the work force as well as those who have been gainfully employed for any number of years. The program further seeks to provide limited quarterly financial assistance to those adult Tribal Members (18 years of age and up) who are full time students who cannot take on a job as well as those who are unemployed, but can demonstrate that they are consistently looking for employment.

RCC is excited to share a letter and pictures from a parent that was extremely excited about the help from the casino - "which put a smile on all of our faces."

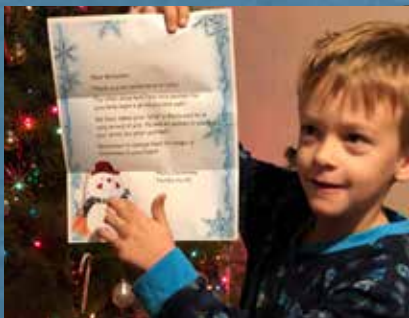

2019 HOUSING SERVICES



Housings programs using the Indian Housing Block Grant (IHBG) from Housing & Urban Development (HUD) and are all designed for low-income applicants.

Emergency Rental Assistance:

This program is designed to assist Tribal Members who find themselves in an emergency situation without funds and needing to move A.S.A.P. Consists of the first month's rent and deposit. An emergency defined in our Policies and Procedures are as follows:

- Homeless due to fire
- Homeless due to flood
- Homeless due to unsafe living conditions
- Homeless due to renting a home that is being sold
- Homeless due to domestic violence - Contingent upon attending counseling
- Medical necessity, due to severe/permanent illness or disability

Student Rental Assistance (POLICY AMENDMENTS):

This program is designed to provide monthly income payments for full time college students for up to four years (i.e. consists of on-going monthly rents plus a one-time deposit)

- Deposit is to be returned to the Tribe upon leaving/graduating the program.
- Full time Students 12 or more units and a grade point average of 2.0 or above
- NEW AMENDMENTS consist of:
 - Tribe's service area to cover entire United States and World for students studying abroad.
 - Rental payment can be made to student if landlord does not accept 3rd party payments as long as proper documentation is submitted (i.e. proof of payment, notice from landlord, etc.)
 - Program will cover up to \$300.00 rental assistance for students who live with parent or relative (i.e. formal rental agreement and W-9 must be submitted)

Amended Enrollment Ordinance APPROVED

Mandatory DNA Testing – Collection Deadline is March 31, 2019

The Tribe's amended Enrollment Ordinance has been approved by the Executive Council as of November 2, 2018.

As per the amended ordinance the mandatory requirement of DNA testing for all current Members applies. As of January 11, 2019 the Executive Council and the Enrollment Committee have set an OFFICIAL DEADLINE of March 31, 2019 for all current Habematolel Pomo of Upper Lake Members to have the DNA testing/collection done. As of March 31, 2019, all current Members must have submitted to DNA collection and testing by the lab and collection agencies retained by the Tribe for this purpose.

What does this mean?

Beginning in 2018, DNA collection was available to members periodically on a voluntary basis, through the agency and lab engaged by the Tribe.

Those Members that have already participated voluntarily during 2018 or 2019 as part of that process, no further action is necessary and a letter from the Enrollment Committee was sent to those who have already had their DNA collected and the committee is in receipt of those results. If you are a member, and did not receive a letter by January 31, 2019, but have had your collection done through the Tribe, contact the Enrollment Committee right away (enrollment@hpultribe-nsn.gov / 707-275-0737 x104).



*For those members who have not participated in having their DNA collection done through the Tribe as of when you receive this publication, **you will need to have the collection done BEFORE the deadline date of March 31, 2019.*** Below is a list of dates for onsite DNA collection at the Habematolel Pomo of Upper Lake Tribal Office.

Members unable to attend one of the onsite collection dates at the Tribal Office must contact the Enrollment

Committee to schedule an appointment. Due to the time it may take to get an appointment scheduled - *it is strongly recommended to request an appointment no later than March 1, 2019 with the actual collection done BEFORE the deadline of March 31, 2019.*

Information that Members must provide in order to schedule an appointment are as follows:

- State your name and the names of all that you want to have tested at the same appointment
- Have a good call back number where you can be reached
- List your address where you want the nearest DNA collection site to be located (i.e. your home address, your school address or work address)
- An email address – We can send you the appointment information when we receive it
- If no email address, a valid mailing address where the information can be mailed
- Special requests – Dates, days, times that work best for you

Upon the Enrollment Committee's receipt of a request for an offsite collection appointment, the Enrollment Committee will then arrange through the LabCorp website, for an appointment. LabCorp will then schedule an appointment at the nearest LabCorp location from the address provided notifying the Enrollment Committee. The committee will then forward the information to the requesting Member.

Important Notes:

- It can take 3-5 days to get an offsite appointment date, time and location – sometimes longer depending on the Member's address and how many individuals will be submitting to a test.
- The appointment can be 2-3 weeks after the initial request is submitted.
- If a Member cannot make the scheduled appointment, advise the Enrollment Committee as soon as possible, so that they may reschedule. Rescheduling can only be done by the Enrollment Committee.
- You are allowed 2 reschedule opportunities

Be sure to plan ahead to account for the March 31, 2019 deadline. **THIS DEADLINE IS THE LAST DAY IN WHICH YOU MUST HAVE THE COLLECTION DONE. MARCH 31 IS NOT THE LAST DAY TO ASK FOR AN APPOINTMENT! IF YOU WAIT UNTIL THEN TO ASK FOR AN APPOINTMENT, YOU WILL MISS THE DEADLINE.**

- It is your responsibility to either attend one of the onsite testing dates at the HPUL Tribal Office or make alternate arrangements using the procedures as stated above by MARCH 31, 2019.

New Applicants:

- DNA testing is now required for all new applicants regardless of whether you are claiming your lineal descendancy through maternal or paternal lines.
- You must make an appointment through the Enrollment Committee and payment must be made in advance. Cash or check only at this time (PAYABLE TO: Habematoel Pomo of Upper Lake). If payment is made with a check, the appointment will not be made until it has cleared.
- A fully complete Enrollment application must be submitted utilizing the newly amended application. If the application is incomplete, the committee will not accept nor show it as having been submitted (with regard to any time sensitive requirements). It will be returned and can be resubmitted upon completion.
- This requirement is for all applications submitted as of the November 2, 2018 and going forward as per the Tribe's approved, amended Enrollment Ordinance.

Blue Ribbon Committee

On December 20, 2018 the Tribe hosted a Blue Ribbon Committee meeting at Running Creek Casino; it was a great turn out. The Blue Ribbon Committee is a 12-member committee for the Rehabilitation of Clear Lake, created by Assembly Bill 707 (Aguilar-Curry, Ch. 842, Statutes of 2017) includes representatives from tribes, Lake County, UC Davis and the Central Valley Regional Water Quality Control Board. It includes four members appointed by Lake County with expertise in agriculture, economics, environment and public water supplies.

The Committee has been given the important charge of making recommendations for rehabilitating Clear Lake, which is critical to Lake County's economy, ecosystem, and heritage. The expertise of these committee members will be invaluable to restoring this precious resource.

Creation of the committee is part of the State of California' ongoing investments in Clear Lake, which include a \$2 million multi-year scientific research contract with UC Davis, \$5 million in voter-approved bonds from Proposition 68, and a recent \$15 million bond-funded investment to aid in the Middle Creek Restoration project.

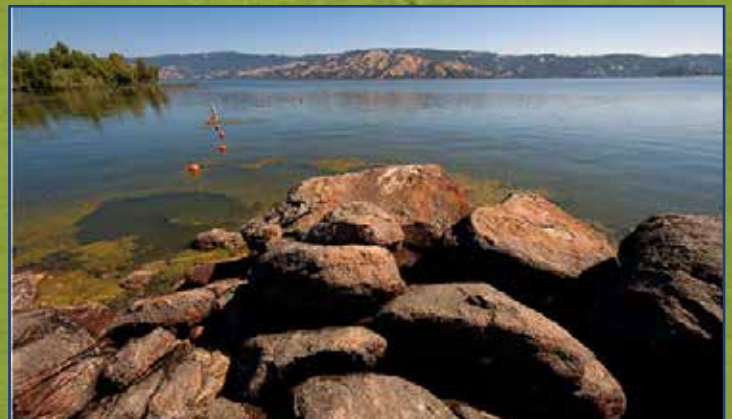

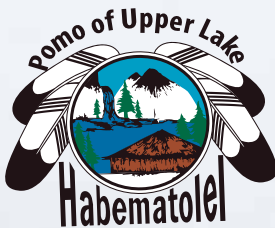

The Tribe's Environmental Department has been busy, busy, busy. We are wrapping up debris removal Cultural Monitoring with Tetra Tech and

Cal Recycle for the season. We should be starting up in the Spring time to complete 25 remaining properties. While monitoring, we recovered a few items of Cultural significance. The Owner of the properties were so gracious to allow us to retain possession of these items.



Another Monitoring Project we are working on is with CalTrans. CalTrans will be replacing a culvert in a sensitive area. Phase II was conducted on the area of concern, out of 15 test holes 14 came back positive for items of cultural significance. The project was completed January 23, 2019.

Announcement of Amendments to Education Graduation Incentive Program w/ Amnesty Clause & Tutoring & Pre-School Tuition Reimbursement Program

As follow up to the Executive Council's monthly meetings of January 11, 2019 and December 14, 2018 the purpose of this correspondence is to notify you of the amendments made to the following 2 Habematolel Pomo of Upper Lake (HPUL) programs:

1. **Education Graduation Incentive Program (EGIP):** incorporated a "retro date" for accepting applications with "amnesty clause"
2. **Tutoring and Pre-School Tuition Reimbursement/ Advancement Program (TPTRAP):** changed the title of this program by adding "Advancement"

Please take note, the HPUL Education Center will be accepting EGIP applications from Members that have graduated or received a certification as allowed within this program **between May 9, 2014 and July 24, 2018**. However a one (1) time "Amnesty Clause" has been placed into effect to award those HPUL Members who have graduated or received a certification between the above-mentioned time

frame. Deadline to apply to EGIP for this one-time Amnesty Clause is set for April 30, 2019.

Please be advised that the Tutoring and Pre-School Tuition Reimbursement Program has changed its name/title to the "Tutoring and Pre-School Tuition Reimbursement/**Advancement** Program (TPTRAP)." Therefore, HPUL Tribal Members may utilize this program as an advancement program as well as a reimbursement.

Applications for both programs are to be submitted to the HPUL Education Center to the attention of Michael Marcks.

Meet Donald Treppa, Eldest HPUL Member!

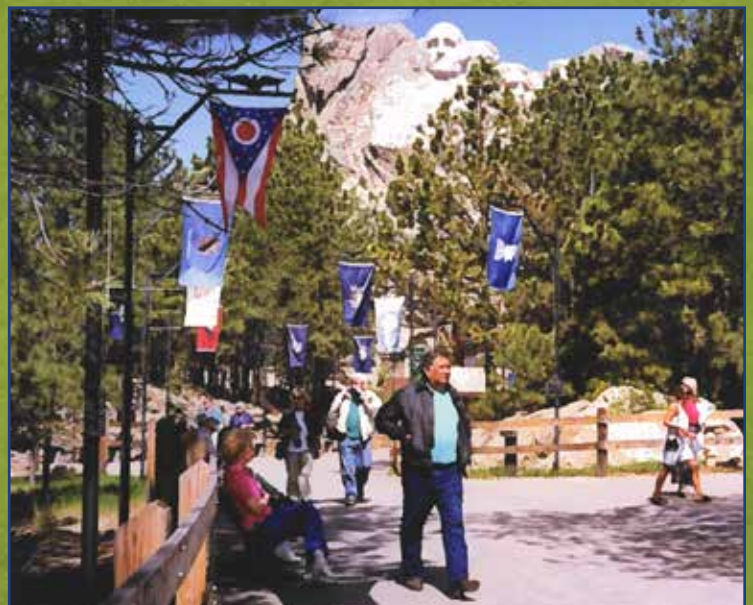


Donald Delmar Treppa Senior, is currently the oldest elder Member of the Habematolel Pomo of Upper Lake Tribe. Treppa was born in 1933 to Frank Milford Treppa and Elvira Frances Pollord. His mother Frances a Native Indian from the Round Valley Tribe was born in 1905. His father Frank Treppa, a Native Indian from the old Robinson Rancheria, in Lake County, was born in 1907. His grandfather was Arthur Treppa, a known statesman, who once shook hands with the 14th Chief Justice of the United States, Earl Warren. Arthur Treppa is known for starting the Upper Lake Rancheria behind the small town of Upper Lake, now known as the Dewell and Hardisty Reservation. Donald Treppa is Arthur Treppa's second grandchild. Eugene Treppa, Donald's older brother died at the young age of two, inspiring the Treppa family move to Upper Lake Rancheria.

Don served in the United States Army and fought in the Korean War for three years. After returning to the states he came home as a Native Vet. His most recognized accomplishments are during his married years to wife Patricia Ann Schellinger, his hometown girlfriend. They

were married in Reno, Nevada in 1957. Both worked in San Francisco as young adults. She worked in a store and later at a bank. Treppa took a job at a boat shop that made huge, hand skilled sailboats, and highly recognized throughout Sausalito and San Francisco, California. Later, he became one of the managers on the floor. One of the 15 employees under his supervision was his younger uncle and good friend Arthur Louis Treppa. Treppa continued to work at the boat shop until 1963. He was asked to sail a custom built schooner around the world but choose to move back to Lake County, as the exposure to the fiber glass and chemicals had started to affect him.

Don's grandfather Arthur Treppa passed in early 1957. With the death of his grandfather and returning from the Korean War he decided to marry Patricia A Schellinger, they had three children, Kathleen, Marchelle, Donald Jr. and a granddaughter McKenzie Paige Boyle. The family moved back to Lake County where Don started up his excavation contractor business with his father. Both worked for the Forest Service. Treppa worked many jobs throughout Lake, Napa, Mendocino and Sonoma Counties. He spent much of his time in Lake Pillsbury and



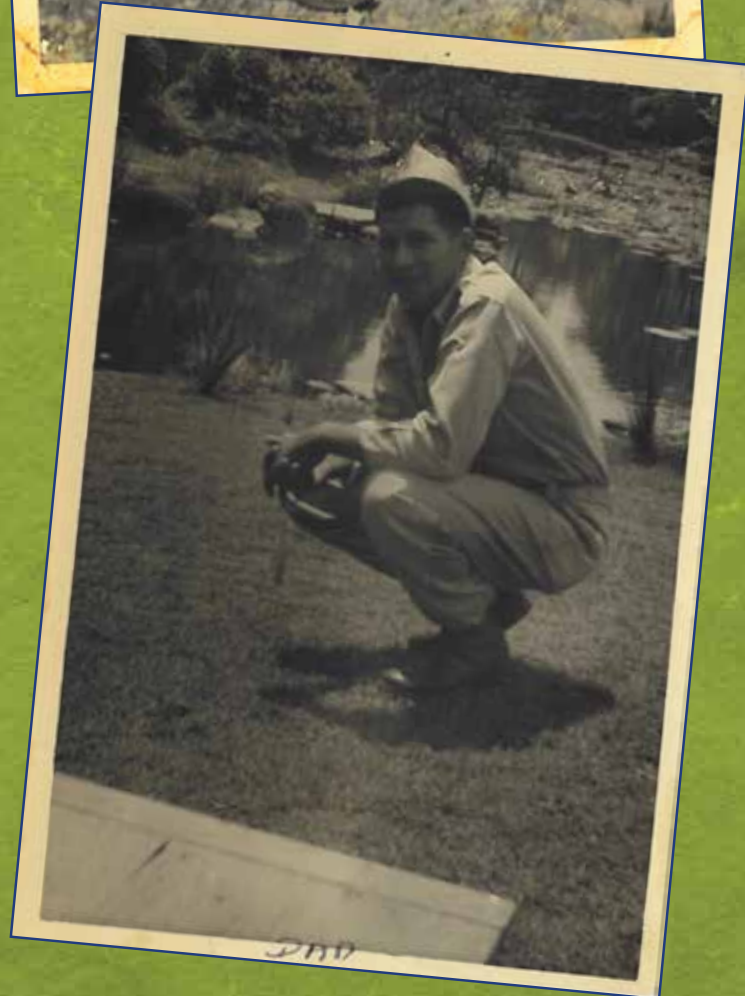
Potter Valley since they were his favorite areas to work.

Treppa is a very active role model in the community. He helped build the Upper Lake Pomo Water Association and mend what he could for both Dewell And Hardisty Rancheria's when asked. He has helped maintain the Upper Lake Rancheria Cemetery when needed with his backhoe and in emergencies such as flooding. He served on the Board of Directors for Lake County Tribal Health Consortium for several years and following in his father and grandfather's footsteps whom helped start Native medical clinics. His mother and father both helped pass the right for Natives in Lake County to vote. It has always been in his blood to help fight for Native American equality.



He is a very accomplished deer hunter; hunting Black Tailed and Elk deer in different states. During his sons younger years Don coached Soap Box Derbies, Farm, Little and Pony League baseball with his son. He played golf, fished and loves the outdoors.

Once Don and Pat retired, they purchased a Cross County Honda motorcycle and traveled the United States. Don remained very active for several years after retirement until his back wore out and retired from his extracurricular activities. Treppa, is now fully retired living in their family home in the Terrace Association of Lakeport, CA; where he was one of the first Natives to purchase land over 50 years ago.

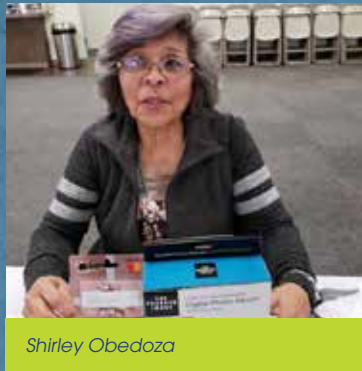
Ida Morrison, would like to give honorable mentions to those who donated items and businesses the Tribe purchased raffle items from.

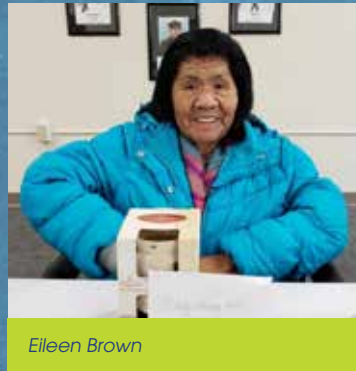

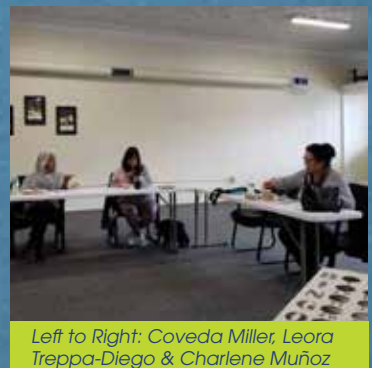
